Society held its annual membership meeting at the Arts Center in Orange. This year's gathering was particularly special, marking the organization's 25th anniversary.

t is uncommon to find abundant, detailed records of early Blackowned businesses in rural Virginia. But, businesses under Black ownership are listed in several volumes of the Virginia Business Directory and Gazetteer for 1906, 1911, and 1917. The **Orange County entries** for those years reveal that Blacks were involved in a significant mixture of retail, agricultural, and professional pursuits throughout the county.
